

road motorcycle sport the interim becomes the normal and I've been at the helm for 10 years!! It will be very interesting to see how the gazette develops over the coming months/years and I am sure it will provide a focal point for all that is happening within the Centre for some time to come.

Putting together my notes to write this Foreword has given me a chance to reflect on my involvement with motorcycle sport, both as a competitor, and subsequently moving into the world of organising and officiating. It was inevitable really given the history of the Armes family within the Centre, over 55 years if I've done my homework correctly. In point of fact it will be a big change in my life as I have actually been involved in motorcycle sport in the Centre since my mum was pushing me around Lyng in a pram. Just a few years later dad was teaching me how to ride a bike, his old BSA Bantam at the same venue; and just a few years after that a certain Dennis Slaughter was teaching me the black art of knocking in stakes and putting up ropes to ACU standards – again at the hallowed ground of Cadders Hill. Given that my start in motorcycle sport was entirely oriented around off road it is a bit surprising that I never really competed in any off road competition. But of course I did have a little go at road racing!

As we all know, it is the Centenary of the Centre this year, and given that we are living in straightened times, and there have been many challenges over the last few years it is heartening to note that during this calendar year we have organised 108 off road events across four disciplines; 25 Motocross, 15 Enduro; 7 Grasstrack; and no less than 61 Trials. And these include everything from beginners/grassroots club events right through to flagship British Championship meetings – something, as a Centre we should all be very proud of. Certainly the Centre Championships have continued to be very well supported, and the motocross discipline has arguably one of the strongest series within the ACU.

If history teaches us anything we must always learn from the past and be ready to take on the challenges of the future. The technological timebomb that has been ticking at ACU head office for a few years is now about to go off and with it the potential to breakdown the Centre structure and management model of the ACU itself. The ACU's new Sport80 website, which is in the process of going live, gives all clubs the independence to deal direct with Rugby on every subject of running events and organising off road motorcycle meetings, thereby making the Centre redundant. So, the new Chairman has an almighty challenge on their hands to restructure the Centre and it's services to make it relevant for the current times. It will take a lot of hard work, not just by the new Chair, but by all of you who believe in providing some form of support and cohesion between all the clubs and disciplines that currently operate some of the best events in the UK.

And finally, it would be unforgivable if I didn't say thank you to everyone that has provided me with the support, and at times, good counsel, in the many positions I have held across the Centre – and especially some cracking content for the gazette. It is always difficult to name names as you always fall into the trap of missing someone out, but I cannot leave this seat as editor of the gazette without saying a huge thank you to Paul Sewter, who has had to put up with, and correct, my many, many, many mistakes and inaccuracies over the years and still put together a 'magazine' that had all the right words and forms – in the right order!!!!!

In closing, I would like to wish all clubs and organisers the very best for the future, and I look forward to bumping into many of you at one or two events around the Centre in the coming years.



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# Recollection Section

Sidge Kenny

One of the most frightening experiences you can have on a motorcycle, is the uncontrollable oscillation of the front wheel from side to side – commonly known as a "wobble" - or "speed wobble". Often, the machine will just give a shake of the handlebars with little deflection from where you are steering. This is something most of us have experienced at one time or another and the bike more or less rides itself out of it. Yet a real head-shaker at speed can be very fearsome and on occasion can

result in a nasty crash. Over the years, several good men have met their end as the result of a speed wobble which got worse. I was once advised if a lock-to-lock wobble did occur, the best way out of it was to wind the throttle wider but rabbit as I am, I always did the other thing and shut off, and have lived to tell the tale.

It appears the worst era for wobbles was pre-war, in the time of rigid rear ends and girder front forks. The evidence being that most motorcycle manufacturers fitted adjustable steering dampers. A factor may have been the engines were getting more powerful whilst frame design fell behind. The advent of the telescopic fork and rear suspension evidently reduced the danger of speed wobbles – though by no means completely. Racing machines often have hydraulic steering dampers connected to the front forks, and it is usually the road rider or road racer, who mostly has to deal with speed wobbles, though an awkward front wheel landing off a jump in motocross can sometimes bring about the start of an equally vicious wobble.

Quite what causes these evil and luckily rare effects, is not clear. Normally motorbikes are very stable machines and yet some adverse and unexpected effect can induce the sweetest steering bike to flick into wobble mode. Tyre pressures or unbalanced wheels might well be a reason and I remember when the first Triumph "Bonnevilles" came on the road – a potent machine at the time some riders complained of wobbly steering at speed in the bends, which they put down to inadequate rigidity at the swinging arm pivot.

I have seen riders deal with wobbles, most particularly on the Isle of Man, where speed, power and the road surface can all combine to cause steering problems. In one case, the bike, cavorting all over the place, came within an inch or two of the kerb in Kirkmichael at well over the ton. The gallant rider wrestled to regain control and gamely pressed on, seemingly unaffected - though I noticed he slightly altered his line on the succeeding laps!

My own worst experience of suffering a wobble at speed was years ago, riding a 500cc Ariel which went into a wicked lock-to-lock shake at around 70 mph. I held on to it – just - and found out later that it occurred on a stretch of road which had "ripples" - little bumps, more or less equally placed. A scientifically minded friend of mine declared it was: "simple harmonics" and that it would only

ever occur at that precise speed, meaning the machine would have steered perfectly normally at a higher or slower pace but from then on, I tackled that stretch of road anyway with greater - and slower - caution. I was also well pitched off and slightly injured when my trials, "Tiger Cub" got into a lock- to-locker and threw me over the front, in of all things, a trial when riding hard in a special and timed test. I think I just hit something off-balance and that set it off. These things happen...

I don't suppose that any motorcycle or two wheeled vehicle would ever be quite immune from wobbling or mis-behaving steering effects of one way or another. We do only have two wheels – placed fore and aft and the very fact we stay upright at all is due to the mysterious force of gyroscopics.



Judging by the emails and phone calls I have received in the last few days the comments made at the recent board meeting regarding possible changes to the format and/or frequency of the gazette, or if it even had a purpose any more, seem to have unfortunately caused a fair bit misunderstanding. To the best of my knowledge no decision was made on the future of the gazette, merely that decisions would have to be made in the future, That is why, when asked by the incoming Chairman if I would be prepared to continue putting the gazette together, as I have for more than a decade, I agreed.

Unfortunately many took comments about the gazette being online in future as a sign that the paper gazette was being discontinued, but would remain in its existing format on the Centre's website, and at least two large clubs (possibly three) have contacted me to say they would no longer require printed gazettes, and would recommend their members access the online version. The online version of the gazette is a byproduct of the production of the printed version. Hence, if there is no printed gazette the online version in its current format will also cease.

Since the introduction of online entries for the various disciplines, great efforts have been made to improve the readability of the gazette with more editorial content. The adoption of full colour printing three years ago has also helped make it more visually appealing, and I am proud that we have a publication that is a good archival record of events within the region.

However, without the clubs distributing the paper gazettes it is difficult to see how it will be economically viable, quite apart from the logistics of delivery. Given that it is therefor a possibility that this could be the last issue of a magazine that has served those in the Centre for over sixty years I could not let this event pass without thanking those who have supplied content for inclusion over the years, and paying tribute to those who have come before me.

Having only been actively involved with the Centre for about 20 years I do not have an in-depth knowledge of those that have come before this time. Knowing how technology has developed within the printing industry during the life of the gazette I can only marvel at the achievement of those who managed to produce and distribute it in those early days. Mention Roneo machines, stencils or Cow Gum to anyone under 30 years old and you are liable to be met with a blank look.

I initially stepped in to help Colin Armes prepare the gazette for print in the latter stages of his terminal illness, and somehow continued for a further 10 years after his son Phil took over the reigns as editor. I believe Roger Chaplin may well have been at the helm at one point, and thank him for his regular contributions since. His able 'apprentice', Paula Day, has stepped into his shoes admirably in the past couple of years with regular enduro reports, always accompanied by some cracking photos. Charlie Ralph has been a regular competitor on the subject of his greatest love (sorry Lyn, it's not you, it's motocross!... but I think you come just ahead of Spurs). Obviously I cannot mention the gazette without paying tribute to 'Sidge' Kenny for his reminiscences in the Recollection Section, the first file I open and read every month when assembling the gazette. If I have not mentioned you by name please accept my apologies, and be assured that I have been grateful for every article or report received. Ron Greengrass has been involved with the Eastern Centre Gazette as long as I can remember, handling the advert sales, distribution and financing, and we all owe him a debt of gratitude for his unwavering service.

I find it particularly sad that this may be the end of the gazette when recent months have seen contributions from a wider variety people, with most disciplines covered. My other concern, given comments by one club that they will concentrate their efforts on promoting their events via social media, is that I will also receive even less information for the website, thus also eventually rendering that redundant, at which point the demise of the Centre risks becoming a self-fulfilling prophecy.



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# **Motocross Reserved Number Scheme**

Renewals Only - available from Friday 2nd December

Now is the time to renew your number for 2023. If you want to ensure you keep the same number for the 2023 season, you must renew it by 31st January 2023 at the latest. **NO NUMBERS WILL BE HELD AFTER THIS DATE.** 

Any numbers not renewed by 31st January will be made available on a first come, first served basis. If you have not renewed your number by this date, there is every possibility that you could lose it to another rider. There were about 700 numbers sold in each of the last 5 years so if you don't want to lose your number, renew it NOW.

You can renew your number online at www.easternacu.org

The cost of reserving your number for 2023 remains unchanged at  $\mathfrak{L}5.50$  per season. This ensures that the chosen charities (East Anglian Air Ambulance, Essex Air Ambulance & ACU Benevolent Fund) receive just over  $\mathfrak{L}5$  per transaction.

Numbers 1 –20 are kept for experts only. Number 1 is reserved for the Centre Champion.

Since its introduction this scheme has enabled the ACU Eastern, on behalf of riders, to make donations of more than £34,000 to the chosen charities.

Any expert graded rider who is registered for an ACU National Motocross Championship may, where able to do so, purchase their registered number - even if it has already been purchased by a junior graded rider. The timing system will correctly calculate championship points and positions where riders compete in separate classes (expert / junior)

# ACU's New Sport8o Members' System and Club Management Platform

#### Briefing document to provide clarity for licence holders

Since we announced the imminent arrival of our new Members' System and Club Management Platform, we have received some questions from ACU licence holders about the adjustments to our sport's administration system and how it will affect their membership experience.

Therefore, we are issuing this Q&A to clearly explain why a new-look administration system is needed to realise new efficiencies and to support the collective effort to build a bright and successful future for motorcycle sports in the UK.

If you still require further clarity after reading this document, please contact the ACU House team directly.

#### Q: Why are you changing the licencing system?

A: The current system is 10 years old and has become outdated. We therefore decided more than a year ago to make a significant investment in an alternative system that harnesses future proof technology, is purposebuilt, user-friendly and brings new administrative efficiencies.

#### Q: Why have you chosen Sport80 to deliver this Cloud-based software platform?

A: Sport80 is a world-renowned provider of sports management systems and works with more than 60 national sporting governing bodies, both in the UK and internationally.

#### Q: Will the platform be easy for licence holders to use?

A: We've conducted a full review of the system – which has taken close to 18 months to build – and we firmly believe it's more user-friendly, intuitive and simpler to use. We are happy that it will enhance the membership experience.

#### Q: Will I be able to access any help when using the new members' system?

**A:** Yes. The system is designed to be very user-friendly, video guides are also available to view by using the link below. Club officials can also speak directly with ACU staff to access support.

### Q: When and how can I apply for my competition licence?

A: You can apply for your licence online from 28th November 2022. When the new platform launches, you will be sent an email that includes a link to set a password and access your account.

#### Q: What information will I need to take out a new licence?

A: You will need to have a current and valid club membership and medical questionnaire to ensure your ACU licence is valid. These items are due to expire on 31st December 2022, so you must renew them early in the new year.

# Q: Will my old licence information appear in the new system?

**A:** Yes. Your ACU licence records will migrate across to the new platform. You will therefore see that several areas of your account are already populated with your details when you log in.

#### Q: Will I receive a plastic licence as in previous years?

A: No. You will receive an e-licence that can be added to your Apple or Android smartphone wallet. If you don't have a smartphone, a PDF version of your licence will be provided and you can download this and print it off

#### Q: How secure is the personal data on the new system?

A: Security is our top priority so that's why state-of-the-art data security, storage and back-up arrangements are provided by world-leading IT service management company Amazon Web Services.

### Q: What happens if an event is cancelled and how will refunds be made?

A: Event entry fees will be refundable subject to any deductions as considered reasonable by the Organising Club.





# **Notes from ACU Eastern Trials Forum**

# Notes from ACU Eastern Trials Forum November 3rd 2022

The 2022 Trials Forum on November 3<sup>rd</sup> at Great Blakenham Parish Rooms, was attended by 23 riders or organisers representing 10 clubs, the full minutes will be posted on the ACU Eastern website, here are some points of note.

- 1. For 2023 the format of all centre trials championships will remain the same as 2022, except for youth riders, see point 2 below.
- 2. The change for 2022 to Youth Expert and Novice, irrespective of age, seems to be working well. There was a proposal to move the Youth Classes to B Class rounds. After discussion this was agreed for the main reason that in B Class Youth Expert could be on Red/Blue, Youth Novice on White route, and potentially a new class of Youth Intermediate on the 50/50 route. This was thought to help Youth progression and Mr Cordle kindly offered to supply an award suitable for Youth Intermediate.
- 3. As the average number of Expert A entries has risen from 2.8 per event in 2021 to 6.4 per event in 2022 it was decided not to change current classes.
- 4. After discussion it was agreed to remove the option for the first lap for Expert A riders in A Class rounds to be non-counting. It was noted that if there were any issues of Expert A delaying completion of events then this option could be reconsidered.
- 5. Riders are reminded that any rider who wants to ride a route lower than any of those available for their class can ride lower routes as Clubman class.
- 6. There are still issues with results not accurately showing the ACU-EC club or riders, not confirming if they are a member of an ACU-EC club. After discussion it was agreed that riders should be encouraged to ensure their online entry data is accurate and complete and clubs should ensure that all available data is included in results, even if this means asking riders at signing on.
- Arrangements were made to get perpetual trials wards back to Mr Hay for engraving for presentation, it was decided to do this by class, A Class Mr Cordle, B Class Mr Snowden, C Class Mr Dopson. Trophies required to Mr Hay before 1<sup>st</sup> January latest.
- 8. There is a potential that the annual multi discipline awards presentation may not take place in early 2023. If this was to happen it was decided to organise a standalone Trials awards presentation evening in a central location. The event would be need to be simple without any food or central funding. Volunteers to organise were Mr Cordle, Mr Plummer and Mr Snowden.
- 9. At a recent trial a group of regular observers has requested would it be possible to make it a rule within ACU-EC trials that all riders should have two riding numbers. After discussion this was agreed to start in 2023, one number on the front of the machine and one fitted to the rear of the rider's helmet. Note riders are responsible for the method of attaching the rear number and ensuring it did not affect the function of their helmet.
- 10. As there were two nominations for the Observers award, it was decided by a show of hands to make the 2022 award to Ron Greengrass. The award to be presented at the annual awards presentation or a local trial if more appropriate.

- 11. There was concern that observers were being distracted to tell riders their recorded scores, observers are reminded that their main task is to observe the riders and do not need to answer questions from riders.
- 12. Clubs are reminded that they can have additional classes, e.g., air cooled mono-shock, and if there is sufficient demand in the future additional or replacement championship classes may be considered.
- 13. Riders and clubs are reminded that information about classes and routes is on the ACU-EC website under Useful Info, Competition Conditions, Trials.
- 14. For 2023 the trials committee will be Paul Nash (Chairman), Clive Dopson (Secretary), Alan Foskew (Stewards Coordinator), Richard Snowden (Recorder), Kevin Hood, Paul Fenn, Eddie Hood, Matthew Neale, Nick Ogden, James Newstead, Andrew Barrell and David Cordle.

Away from the Forum the 2022 Novice Champion, Aaron Richardson, is promoted to Intermediate from 1/1/23
